due to the Covid-19 restrictions, Northshoreans could finally celebrate Chinese New Year as a whole school this year!

There were various exciting and meaningful classroom activities planned. Before the actual celebration, Primary 1 students learned to use simple crafts (lanterns) to reiterate the story of Nian to their parents. Primary 2 and 3 students had a hands-on experience with Chinese calligraphy. Primary 2 students were taught Chinese calligraphy techniques to write the word 吉(luck) while the Primary 3 students tried their hands at paper-cutting and worked on the word 春(spring).

Tamil Mother Tongue Fortnight



The Tamil Mother Tongue Fortnight was conducted in April 2023. Various meaningful and fun activities were conducted for the Primary 1 and Primary 2 Tamil Students.

Students enjoyed watching videos of some Indian Traditions followed by a rich conversation in class. Students also attended speech and drama programmes where they learnt acting techniques and skills and spoke Tamil fluently.

All Tamil students enjoyed the Dance programme conducted during this Mother Tongue Fortnight. The Primary 1 students learnt Kumi dance which involves clapping, footwork and rhythm coordination, and the P2 students learnt Oyilattam, which consists of the use of two handkerchiefs to perform rhythmic steps to the musical accompaniment. Through this dance programme, our students learnt to show appreciation for the diverse folk dance forms.

The Tamil Mother Tongue Fortnight event concluded with the students presenting their learning in class through a Show and Tell session.







Earth Day 2023

In April, Northshoreans showed solidarity towards the conservation of Mother Earth. This year's Earth Day theme centred around taking concrete actions to reduce our carbon footprint, protect biodiversity, conserve natural resources, and promote sustainable practices.

For a whole week, our students learned more about taking public transport to reduce carbon footprint, recyclables and non-recyclables, the different types of electronic waste and the right bins to place these items in. They were also introduced to the National Environment Agency's new mascot, Bloobin, a blue recycling bin frustrated by the years of contamination! Northshoreans watched videos and engaged in rich discussion with their Form Teachers on how to recycle right. Some students even brought recyclable items from home and encouraged others to do the same!

As a school, we have put these words to action through a collective effort to reduce electricity consumption. All the classes switched off their lights and fans for ten minutes during morning assembly. To top it all off, both staff and students wore green clothing and gathered in the hall for the weekly assembly programme where they learned more about Earth Day and simple conservation efforts they can engage in. It was a sight to behold!

They have shown the desire to play an active role in improving the world around them by taking concrete actions, empowered by the knowledge gleaned from rich learning experiences.
