Celebrating Chinese New Year and Mother Tongue Fortnight 2025

From 20 to 24 January 2025, our school celebrated Mother Tongue Fortnight and Chinese New Year with a series of interactive activities that deepened students' appreciation of Chinese traditions.

The Primary 1 students explored the Nian legend through storytelling and lantern-making, while the Primary 2 students practised Chinese calligraphy and joined a festive market role-play. The Primary 3 students crafted greeting cards for their peers in China and decorated classrooms with traditional paper cuttings. While the Primary 4 students illustrated CNY customs and taboos, the Primary 5 students designed creative "Reunion Dinner Sets" to highlight festive dishes.

On 28 January, our students participated in engaging classroom activities before gathering in the school hall to enjoy a concert featuring a face-changing opera, a Wushu showcase, and a Chinese opera adaptation of Journey to the West. The celebration ended with a lively lion dance and mass singing, during which students exchanged mandarin oranges with teachers.

These activities allowed students to embrace cultural traditions while deepening their connection to the Chinese language.

Celebrating Hari Raya Aidilfitri 2025

On 2 April, our school celebrated Hari Raya Aidilfitri with interactive performances that deepened students' appreciation of Hari Raya traditions. The performance by 'Funplay Workshop' encouraged students to be mindful of their actions during visiting especially on excessive usage of the gadgets. Students are exposed to the importance of spending quality time and interacting with their family and friends to strengthen their bonds. Then the Primary 2 Malay Language students took the stage, dressed in vibrant, coordinated costumes that shimmered under the stage lights. Their faces were lit with excitement and focus, expressing the joy and energy of the performance.

During the recesses, the Primary 2 students displayed their creativity by designing a ketupat-shaped bookmark. The Malay Language students were also involved in making Hari Raya cards, recycled lamps called 'lampu pelita' which they made to immerse themselves in the Hari Raya traditions.







Mother Tongue Fortnight - Tamil

As part of the fortnight celebrations, our students engaged in a variety of activities that deepened their understanding of Tamil language and culture. They sang songs to learn about animals, listened to traditional Indian stories, and creatively retold them in modern contexts. Students explored the lives of notable Indian historical figures through role-play. They also learned about the significance of a traditional South Indian meal and recreated it using clay on banana leaves. Our Primary 3 and 4 students participated in making 'Thoranam' and arranged food cut-outs on banana leaves as part of the recess activities. These activities made learning immersive, fun, and culturally enriching for all students.

Total Defence Day


























Forging Friendship in a Complex World



Grooving with Confidence: The Amis Beatbox Experience for Primary 3!



LLP Committee: Earth Day 2025

Northshoreans commemorated Earth Day this year on 23 April. This year's theme was 'Our Power, Our Planet', a call for everyone to unite around renewable energy so we can triple clean electricity by 2030. In addition to this, our students were engaged in fun-filled activities as part of water conservation education.

The Lower Primary students learned more about the importance of energy conservation and simple ways they can protect our planet. In their classrooms, they watched informative videos and had rich discussions. They also participated in level quizzes on Kahoot! The highlight of their day was the 'Saving Water' challenge during snack time, where their teachers rationed water from two 1.5 litre bottles for them to rinse their hands before and after eating. Our students were excited to see how much water they needed to use and were in awe of the amount they managed to conserve at the end of the day!

As for the Middle Primary students, they learned more about energy conservation in Singapore and ways they can save water in school and at home. Due to the wet weather this year, they headed to the school canteen field and participated in 'Save Every Drop, an interclass relay, where they had to work in pairs to wring a wet rag. This required them to demonstrate teamwork and self-discipline. The water was collected in containers and classes competed to see who could conserve as much as possible!

A new interclass relay was introduced this year to the primary five students. They became designers of their own wind-harnessed cars using repurposed materials as a nod towards sustainability. In the Northshore Grand Prix, students used a fan to generate wind energy to propel their cars forward. They practiced turntaking and cheered each other on, in a bid to get their cars to travel the greatest distance possible. Our students displayed high levels of tenacity as each class was determined to emerge as level victors.

Through play, our students learned important lessons on how to protect Mother Nature so that everyone can enjoy a healthy planet for generations to come.





Game On for Healthy Ageing!

Connecting the Silver Generation: Games for Healthy Ageing is this year's Primary 4 Interdisciplinary Project Work (IPW) theme. As part of the Applied Learning Programme (ALP), students design games that promote physical activity, social interaction, and cognitive stimulation for the elderly. Spanning over three terms and integrating subjects like Math, English, Science, Art, and PE, the project builds critical thinking, creativity, collaboration, and communication skills. Students also apply Design Thinking and Values in Action throughout. The project

culminates in a final group presentation of their game prototype and a Games and Toys Exhibition (GaTE) in Term 3, where they gather feedback from peers through user testing.
