Primary 3 Outdoor Education (OE) Day Camp

"The mountains are calling, and I must go!" These are the famous words of Scottish-born American naturalist and mountaineer, John Muir (1838 – 1914). The outdoor enthusiast was fascinated by the outdoors and his passion for nature led him on a life-long quest to protect the environment.

At Northshore Primary School, our Learning for Life Programme (LLP) – Outdoor Education and Caring for our Environment at Northshore (OCE@N) aims to raise young environmentalists through experiential outdoor and sustainability education.

30 August 2023 was an adventurous day for our Primary Three students as they experienced an OE day camp in school. They picked up orienteering skills to navigate the outdoors and risk assessment management. They also learnt to identify potential hazards and ways to reduce the impact of the risks. A first aid course was also incorporated into the day camp to equip our campers with the basic skills of helping the injured. While there were no marshmallows or s'mores roasting over open fires, the outdoor cooking demonstration was still a tantalising experience for our Northshoreans who had not tried preparing food using mess tin and solid fuel.

The day camp ended with 3 Bly being the best performing class! Like John Muir, our Primary Three campers have lived up to the school vision "Courage to Explore" and in time to come, we are certain that our Northshoreans will do their part in caring for our environment and preserving biodiversity.

Math Week

The annual Math Week, with the objective to imbue the love for the subject in the students, was held in Term 4 Week 1. With the theme, *Numbers Around Us!*, the Mathematics Department teachers were determined to make Mathematics learning fun and get the students to appreciate it through discovering its applications in the 'real-world' context. An array of activities for the *Let's Play Math!* and *Math Day Out!* segments were planned for the students to participate during recess and in Math lessons.

Let's Play Math! consists of a series of specially curated activities for the students to practise what they had learnt during lessons through fun and physical games. In line with this year's theme, *Let's Play Math*! integrated numbers into the various recess games. Besides the engaging recess games, the students also took on the role of Math Detectives and went hunting for Palindrome numbers around the school hall.

Math Day Out! are teacher-designed Mathematics trails for the students to explore how Mathematics is used beyond the classrooms. The students went on a scavenger hunt to complete mathematical tasks based on the clues provided. During the trail, the students also had a lot of fun using technology tools such as Nearpod, AR Makr and Deckle.

This year, while the Primary 1 and 2 students explored the different areas within the school during the trail, the Primary 3 students ventured out to Northshore Plaza. Apart from solving Mathematics problems, the Primary 3 students were given the opportunity to discuss and express their thoughts on social-emotional issues such as inclusivity and diversity.
